## **Food** (Subject: Communication and language/Writing)


Reception: I can design a food plate for my chosen country and talk about it.

Year 1: I can design a food plate and describe it using simple sentences.

Year 2: I can compare the food of my chosen country to the country I live in. I can write sentences using 'but' e.g. — In Spain, Churros is a traditional pudding but apple pie is a traditional pudding in England.

Before designing your food plate, you could use the internet to research traditional food from your chosen country. You could pick breakfast, lunch or dinner.

Think about how you could present your plate. You could collage, draw, paint or print pictures and label it.









Listen to parts of the book here (Subject: Reading)

Reception: I can listen and respond to what I hear.

Year 1: I can listen to and talk about what is being read.

Year 2: I can listen to and discuss what is being read.

### **Music** (Subject: Music/Expressive Arts and Design)

Reception: I can listen to music from around the world.

Year 1: I can listen to music from my country and add simple body percussion.

Year 2: I can identify the beat in a piece of music and use objects around the house to create a beat. I can compare music from my chosen country to the country I live in.

Can you find a piece of music from your chosen country on YouTube? Or have you got any music at home already? Take some time to listen and talk about the music. What instruments can you hear? How would you make the music with parts of your body?

## **Homes** (Subject: Design and Technology/Expressive Arts and Design)

Reception: I can say what I notice about homes in my chosen country.

Year 1: I can talk about how the home is suited to its environment. I can draw the home and label it using simple adjectives.

Year 2: I can talk about the similarities and differences of the home compared to my home. I can draw a picture of my home/the other home and write sentences to compare.

Research homes in your chosen country. How is a traditional home different to your home? You might want to present your findings as a drawing, poster, fact file, or even a video. If you have any junk modelling materials e.g. empty boxes and bottles, you can have a go at building your own home.
